Five questions: with Fr. Bedford Doucette, Director of the Permanent Diaconate for the Diocese of Antigonish. On **Sept. 20, 4 pm at St. Ninian Cathedral**, eight new deacons will be ordained, joining the 10 deacons currently in our diocese.

1. What is a deacon and what does he do?

A deacon is, first of all, one who experiences a call, a “nudge” from God through the Church to be in a certain relationship with God, the Church, the world, as well as his wife and family. A deacon is ordained into the Order of Deacons to be the sacramental sign of Christ the Servant. The deacon IS the effective sign of Christ’s care and love for the poor, the marginalized, the sick and dying, all those in need of any kind. From this identity his ministry is three-fold:

- 1) Ministry of Service: encouraged to spend 2/3 of their time in service to those in need.
- 2) Ministry of the Word: to live the Good News through the proclamation of the Gospel, religious formation of all ages, preaching on designated Sundays and events.
- 3) Ministry of the Altar: to assist the Community of Faith at celebrations of Eucharist

In our tradition, the Bishop and the deacon share a unique relationship so that the deacon is seen as the eyes, ears and hands of the caring ministry of the Bishop. It is the Bishop who appoints a deacon to a ministry of Service and to a liturgical base (parish).

2. What is involved in becoming a deacon?

A deacon’s process of discernment begins at Baptism in the context of his family and religious upbringing. At a certain point in his relationship with the Church, he inquires about Diaconate, has interviews for information and discernment towards a decision to apply. After acceptance as an “aspirant”, (one who aspires to diaconate), he is admitted to candidacy which is a continued discernment process wherein he studies theology, pastoral practice, spiritual direction and a mentored service ministry. With his spouse he continues for four years of one weekend a month with the group of candidates discerning their vocation.

3. What role does the deacon serve in our diocese, and will that change?

Deacons minister in nursing homes, hospitals, correctional centers, home visitation, palliative care, with seniors, catechetics, youth work, social justice issues, justice system, and whatever the bishop asks of him. Some deacons act on diocesan commissions. Roles could vary as the needs of people and the diocese change. Deacons are seen baptizing, marrying, burying, preaching, instructing, and part of a pastoral team Ministry.

4. Is the Ordination of Deacons on Sept. 20 something we can all celebrate?

By all means and enthusiastically, as this is a genuine diocesan celebration. These eight men will be ordained in the midst of the priests, deacons, religious, and parishioners of the Diocese who are most welcome and invited to see new life in the Church.

5. Are you accepting new candidates to the Diaconate?

We have no class for next year but are hoping that interested men will contact Fr. Bedford Doucette, Director of Deacons at bedford@dioceseofantigonish.ca and 902-578-4375. If enough come forward we will form a class again. Please pray for our deacons!

Mass for Shut-ins first aired in 1963 and is now the longest running CTV television program in Canada. The program airs Sundays at 11:30 am, and is now available for on-demand viewing on the diocesan YouTube channel or via the Mass for Shut-Ins button on MyParish App. “ So many depend on this Mass for spiritual nourishment every week,” said producer Fr. Patrick O’Neill. “I receive so many letters thanking our diocese and volunteers for this Mass.”

Our History

On **September 22, 1844** the Roman Curia created our diocese. Its first seat was in Arichat, where St Francis Xavier University was founded in 1853. Early parishioners were the Mi'kmaq who had welcomed Jesuit missionaries to their shores, Acadians who had endured the Grand Dérangement, Irish fishermen and Highland Scots.

In 1886, the seat was moved to Antigonish and our diocese continued to grow, ministering in Latin America as well as supporting schools, media, and social programs here at home.
